50 years global health progress



- ✓ Life expectancy has increased from 47 years (1948) to 72 today worldwide.
- ✓ We eradicated smallpox. This disease infected 50 million people in 1948.
- Today we have 26 vaccines to prevent diseases. Immunization saves between 2 and 3 million children's lives per year.
- ✓ HIV / AIDS, once fatal, has now become a controllable disease. Today 21 million have access to ARV therapy.

- People are still paying too much out of their own pockets
- We need to do more to tackle health system failures.
